The USS Yorktown "The Fighting Lady"

At nearly 900 feet in length, weighing in at more than 27,000 ton and bristling with weapons and war planes, the aircraft carrier USS Yorktown (CV-10) was one of the most imposing modern marvels on the planet during WWII. But it was her crew, some 2,500 sailors, who brought her to life, generated her fearless spirit and christened her with the nickname, "The Fighting Lady".



CV-10's keel was laid on December 1, 1941 at Newport News, Virginia. This was a new breed of ship; the Essex class carrier. Longer, wider and heavier than its predecessor, the Essex class could hold more aircraft and became the backbone of the WWII Navy. Originally, CV-10 was to be known as the Bon Homme Richard but was renamed in honor of the only American carrier lost in the pivotal Battle of Midway, USS Yorktown (CV-5).



In the years that followed WWII, continued to play a vital role for the Navy including involvement in the Vietnam War. Yorktown even earned a place in space exploration history with the recovery of NASA's Apollo 8 crew in 1968.

EVENT INFORMATION

Up to 1200 guests can enjoy cocktails and dinner utilizing the hanger bays and flight deck. A new air conditioned ballroom is slated for completion in the spring of 2009, with new elevators and handicap accessible restrooms recently added.

USS Yorktown – The Fighting Lady offers a ballroom space for up to 500 seated on the Flight Deck and reception space for 2000. Note the grand “Congressional Medal of Honor Museum”, a plus for all groups to experience.



28 Bridgeside is a private event venue offering expansive views of the Arthur Ravenel Bridge; the largest free span bridge in America. Located on the banks of the Cooper River, this location offers great flexibility for theme events!

The American La France Fire Engine Museum

A few short years ago, leadership from the City of North Charleston and American LaFrance had a dream of partnering together to build a museum that would showcase the corporate collection of antique fire fighting apparatus while educating visitors on the heritage of fire fighting, the dangers of fire and the methods of fire prevention. Today, we are pleased to see that dream become reality with the opening of the North Charleston and American LaFrance Fire Museum and Educational Center which is conveniently located adjacent to Tanger Outlet Mall. Also housed within the facility is North Charleston satellite office of the Convention and Visitors Bureau which will provide services to tourists coming through and staying in North Charleston. As visitors enter the facility with the massive, mahogany firehouse doors into the 25,000 square foot facility, they take a step back in time.



Beginning with the early 1800s and the fire apparatus of that day, it is easy to see how fire fighting and its vital importance to our lives have progressed over the years. The fire safety education exhibits are incomparable, designed to not only teach our visitors about the history of fire fighting and educate them on methods of the prevention of home fire hazards, but to also provide entertainment for our young visitors while they experience the thrill of flying down a fire pole and learning smart ways to exit a burning building.

EVENT INFORMATION

Though inside seating is limited at this event, expansive tenting can be added in the adjacent space, making this the perfect event venue less than a quarter of a mile from the North Charleston Convention Center! Transportation charges can be affordable through shuttling.

The Great Gatsby...A Garden Party...Blues, Brews and BBQ The Theme Choice is Yours at Middleton Place Gardens

Middleton Place is a carefully preserved 18th-century plantation that has survived the Revolutionary and Civil Wars, but also an earthquake. It was the home of Henry Middleton, President of the First Continental Congress; his son Arthur, a signer of the Declaration of Independence; his grandson Henry, Governor of South Carolina and an American Ambassador to Russia; and great-grandson, William, signer of the Ordinance of Secession. Today, this National Historic Landmark encompasses America's oldest landscaped gardens, the Middleton Place House and the Plantation Stable Yard.



The Gardens, which Henry Middleton created in 1741, reflect the grand classic style that was in vogue in Europe and England in the early part of the 18th century. Today, as they did then, the gardens represent the Low Country's most spectacular expression of an 18th century ideal - the triumphant marriage between man and nature.


EVENT INFORMATION

The existing Pavilion at Middleton accommodate up to 250 guests seating, with expansive surrounding oaks perfect for picnicking. The adjoining Greensward is the perfect location for tenting up to 1200 guests.



The Charleston Visitors Center

Constructed in stages from 1840 to 1856, the Charleston Visitor Reception and Transportation Center is in an area designated as a National Historic Landmark District. The Charleston Visitor Reception and Transportation Center is located in the old Deans Warehouse between Ann and John Streets at 375 Meeting Street in downtown Charleston. Constructed in stages from 1840 to 1856, it is one of five railroad buildings known collectively as the "William Aiken House and Associated Railroad Structures" and is listed as a National Historic Landmark District.

The Joseph P. Riley Stadium

With considerable assistance from the City of Charleston and a unique partnership with The Citadel, the Charleston RiverDogs opened the 1997 season at the brand new, \$19.5 million Joseph P. Riley, Jr. Park on the banks of the scenic Ashley River.

Along with a breathtaking, picturesque facility came a new affiliation with the Tampa Bay Devil Rays. The facility is named for the long-time mayor of Charleston, Joseph P. Riley, Jr.



He is one of the city's great promoters of the game of baseball, and despite his objections, city council voted unanimously to name the facility in his honor. While Riley Park is indeed fan-friendly, the facility was designed with the spectators' needs in mind. From nearly every spot in the facility, fans can get to a rest room or a concession stand within a 45-second walk.



2006, The Joe unveiled a brand new video board in right-center field and a LED scoreboard in left-center field to help enhance the spectator's enjoyment of the game.

EVENT INFORMATION

The field can be used at certain times of the year for concerts or tenting for theme events. Grand spaces at the top of the stadium seats are available, as are VIP boxes, for separate theme venues within one space.

Boone Hall Plantation

In 1743, the son of Major John Boone planted live oak trees, arranging them in two evenly spaced rows. This spectacular approach to his home symbolizes southern heritage and will take root in your memory for many years to come. It would take two centuries for the massive, moss-draped branches to meet overhead, forming today's natural corridor and a scene that NBC Daytime television says is "a must see stop on any trip to Charleston, S.C."



Boone Hall is also one of America's oldest working, living plantations. We have been continuously growing and producing crops for over 320 years. Once known for cotton and pecans, we are still actively producing peaches, strawberries, tomatoes and pumpkins, as well as many other fruits and vegetables for our visitors to enjoy.

EVENT INFORMATION

Boone Hall offers a variety of combinations for large groups. The Cotton Dock, which seats 200 guests, can be used for an after dinner dance and dessert location for up to 500. The rear lawn can accommodate tenting for up to 5000! Local community events are held here annually, such as the Lowcountry Oyster Festival (3000 guests), the Taste of Charleston (5000 guests) and various historic re-enactment events.



Drayton Hall

Imagine enjoying cocktails and hors d'oeuvres with your staff or clients by the banks of the Ashley River, underneath the winding branches of a live oak tree, by a Victorian reflecting pond, or on the portico of an architectural masterpiece. Instead of sitting down to dinner or a lecture with a background of wallpaper, imagine seeing the allee of azaleas or the stunning land-front façade of the oldest



Georgian Palladian building in the United States. When the National Trust purchased Drayton Hall from the Drayton family in 1974, they purchased a house that had survived the better part of three centuries, the only plantation on the Ashley River to survive intact to present-day. But survival alone isn't what makes Drayton Hall unique. Even more remarkable is the fact that Drayton Hall survived without ever having been substantially altered — in near-original condition.



Rather than restoring the house to reflect a single period of grandeur, the National Trust made the bold decision to preserve the site as it was received from the Draytons in 1974 in order to provide a time line showing change and continuity through three centuries of American history. In the great hall, you'll look up at hand carved moldings that date to the house's construction and a cast plaster ceiling added in the 1850s. In the withdrawing room, you'll see one of just a handful of original hand-molded ceilings left in the United States and traces of the original cream-colored paint.



And our interpreters will introduce you to events from the three centuries of American history that this house has witnessed.

EVENT INFORMATION

Tenting for up to 1000 guests can be erected on this location. Some themes can dictate using a variety of smaller tents for cocktail party style – buffet events.

EVENT INFORMATION

The Best "Dine Around" in the South happens all within walking distance here in the Holy City. Guests can gather for a central starter reception or afterwards for "bubbles and sweets".

Here are a few of our favorite restaurants...

Anson - 12 Anson Street

Quintessentially Charleston with its Southern architecture, elegant interior decor and gracious hospitality, Anson's exquisite Lowcountry cuisine features seafood caught daily in local waters, big city steaks, veal chops, osso buco, crisp pizzas, satisfying pastas, and Southern grits. Anson's wine list is bountiful and the service is world class.

Blossom – 171 East Bay Street

Dozens of chefs can't be wrong, and if you hit Blossom on a late Saturday night, you'll find numerous culinary stars mingling around the bar. Chef Adam Close serves small plates and great entrees on the seafood-heavy menu and brings his own take on contemporary American cuisine to what is still one of the best places to grab a lunch or dinner on East Bay.



Carolina's – 10 Exchange Street

A landmark in Charleston's culinary history for over 40 years, Carolina's offers their guests eclectic Lowcountry cuisine in a fun, festive dining atmosphere. Executive Chef and

Charleston native Jeremiah Bacon has cornered the market on European-inspired Lowcountry cuisine and creates seasonal menus unique to any other restaurant in the region. Proclaimed by The New York Times as "one of the most elegant restaurants on the East Coast," Carolina's remains a Charleston tradition.

Charleston Grill - 224 King Street

Contemporary Lowcountry cuisine featuring fresh local produce, seafood and game, prepared with a French accent. Emphasis is placed on the quality of the ingredients, unique presentations and sophisticated textures. Local ingredients include rabbit, oysters, crabmeat, shrimp, fish, duck, greens and grains. Paneled walls, herringbone floors, softly padded carver chairs and local folk art blend with live jazz to create an elegant, but casual setting. .



Cypress - 167 East Bay Street

Cypress "raises the bar" for Charleston as it combines professional service, an elegant environment and exceptional contemporary American food. Cypress offers a more formal dining area downstairs, with jackets being a requirement for men, while the upper level includes private dining areas and a more casual bar. A 21-foot-tall wine wall enclosed in glass contains 4,000 bottles with 35 wines by

the glass. The restaurant has retained a Charleston feel by preserving the original posts and brick walls from its 1834 structure.

Circa 1886 – 149 Wentworth Street

Tucked behind the stately Wentworth Mansion is one of Charleston's hidden gems. Circa 1886, named for the year the Wentworth Mansion was built, is home to some of Charleston's finest fare. With a wine list that boasts close to 280 bottles, and contemporary cuisine influenced by Charleston's rich history, this five-star restaurant offers diners an intimate evening that won't soon be forgotten. The menu changes seasonally, keeping abreast of the freshest local produce and seafood.



FIG - 232 Meeting Street

FIG (Food Is Good) is an intimate neighborhood bistro serving a "seasonally inspired menu". FIG focuses on the resources of the area to create a daily changing menu featuring Dayboat Seafood, an abundance of Local produce, and farm raised meats and poultry.

Fish – 442 King Street

Executive Chef Nico Romo continues to dish out exciting food, focusing more than ever on delivering exemplary seafood preparations that showcase the freshest fish available on the market. Fish is seasonally-inspired French-Asian cuisine in a warm, eclectic and inviting space. Fish is housed in a beautifully renovated, 1837 Charleston single-style home in the heart of the Upper King Design District. Featuring an array of locally-sourced fish, seafood and produce, Fish is much more than just seafood, with local beef, pork, chicken and tofu also making menu appearances.



Grill 225 – 225 East Bay Street

Grill 225 specializes in quintessential steak house cuisine, but the ingredients are unique among Charleston's restaurants. The menu offers a variety of your favorite meats, including a 40-ounce prime porter house steak, double cut lamb chops, prime rib and veal and they take special care of the seafood lovers with an array of the freshest seafood such lobsters and crab cakes that were deemed the best in the city by the Post and Courier. No matter what you order at Grill 225, we want it to be the best you've ever had. Simple. High quality. Plentiful.



Hank's – 10 Hayne Street

The venerable old warehouse raw bar and seafood palace has weathered nicely over the years to become Charleston's truest fish house. When the entrance alcove is jammed and seats are impossible to obtain, a flute of champagne and sampler tray of iced shellfish at the long community table can provide the perfect start to a night on the town.



High Cotton - 199 East Bay Street

Like the time-honored phrase, High Cotton is first class, high spirited and exemplifies "living' large". It's an unabashedly masculine and American saloon. The food is straightforward and robust. Red Meat, Game and Fresh Fish. No confetti on the plates or in the descriptions.

Magnolia's - 185 East Bay Street

Historic charm blends with contemporary excitement to create the atmosphere of Charleston's most popular restaurant. "THE place in downtown Charleston" according to Travel & Leisure Magazine. Uptown American cuisine with a down South flavor featuring a wide variety of your menu favorites uniquely prepared by Chef Donald Barickman.



McCrary's – 2 Unit Alley

Built in 1788, McCrary's was the favored gathering place for Charleston's early leaders and even hosted a dinner for President George Washington. Now listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the warmth and elegance of its 218-year-old exposed brick walls and fireplaces are accented with soaring skylights, dramatic chandeliers, bluestone tiles and a striking two-story wine bar. In this spectacular setting, acclaimed Chef Sean Brock extends McCrary's tradition of excellence with imagination, passion and technique ranging from classical to cutting edge.

Mercato – 102 North Market Street

Bella! Your table is waiting. Enter MERCATO and be transported from historic City Market to a ristorante in Milano or Roma. Its long, Euro swank marbled bar is bathed in the golden glow of deco chandeliers, where attractive and spirited patrons start the evening with martinis, Bellinis and Chiantis. Settle into a plush leather booth downstairs or ascend the illuminated staircase to the serene elegance of seating upstairs under the dome. Savor authentic Italian classics, faithfully recreated by Chef Jacques Larson, as well as innovations that amaze and delight.

Oak Steakhouse - 17 Broad Street

Chef Brett McKee, described as "a culinary genius" and a "top notch chef" by the Charleston Post and Courier, is also a whirlwind of activity.

Here, McKee presents classic steakhouse fare, weaving his signature Italian flavors and dishes throughout.





Peninsula Grill – 112 North Market Street
Haute cuisine and high spirits. Steaks and chops, fish and oysters, champagne and lobster along with proper cocktails, served with style each evening by chef/partner Robert Carter and staff. The atmosphere is sophisticated and clubby, not formal. Walls are covered in rich velvet with antique Cyprus woodwork, 19th-century oil paintings and contemporary renderings of local plantation life. Beyond the

room are views of the lush Garden Courtyard and reflecting pool. Experience the acclaimed fare of four-star Peninsula Grill.



Tristan - 55 South Market Street

Tristan offers a Bold American menu with a global influence in a beautiful, yet relaxed atmosphere that reflects the cosmopolitan character of a fine dining establishment. Tristan offers an energetic bar and an award-winning wine list comprised of over 400 wine selections. Chef Aaron Deal brings tremendous energy to his role as Executive Chef, guiding an eclectic, international menu through each season. Serving prime beef, the finest fish flown in from around the world, local seasonal vegetables, makes the dining at Tristan one of Charleston's finest dining experiences. Every step has been taken to make your dining experience one of extreme fulfillment.

Family Circle Cup Tennis Stadium

In 2000, Family Circle magazine became the first title sponsor to partner with city and county municipalities to build a state-of-the-art tennis facility that would be home to America's oldest all-women's Tier I event. With support from the City of Charleston, Daniel Island, the state of South Carolina, and Charleston and Berkeley counties, the \$15 million dollar Family Circle Tennis Center was opened in the spring of 2001. Surrounded by lush landscape and century old oaks, the Family Circle Tennis Center was designed to highlight the charm and beauty of the Lowcountry.



This award-winning public facility is first class in every sense of the word. With 17 championship tennis courts (13 clay, 4 hard and all courts lighted for night play), the Tennis Center is a 32-acre state of the art facility highlighted by the 10,200 seat Family Circle Magazine Stadium. A unique 10,000 square foot Clubhouse serves as the hub of activity on a year-round basis. The first level of the Clubhouse features the Tennis Center Pro Shop. The pro shop offers a multitude of amenities for club members and patrons, including tennis clothing, luxury locker room facilities, racquets, accessories and professional stringing services. The clubhouse also serves as the corporate headquarters for the Family Circle Cup. Overlooking the majestic Althea Gibson Club Court and a stone's throw from the water, the Clubhouse mirrors the traditional, architectural charm synonymous with the South.

The facility also hosts a variety of events throughout the year including concerts, festivals, tournaments and other special activities. In 2001 the USTA selected the facility to receive the Public Facility of the Year award as part of their annual Outstanding Facilities Awards.



EVENT INFORMATION

The Family Circle Tennis Center is the perfect place for an array of activities. This year-round venue currently hosts concerts, camps, cultural festivals, athletic events, and other activities throughout the year. Over the past few years, many of the music industry's top acts have entertained audiences at the Family Circle Magazine Stadium. The stadium has received glowing reviews as Charleston's top outdoor arena and is considered the perfect setting for a concert under the stars. John Mayer, Don Henley, B.B. King, Al Green, Daryl Hall and John Oates, Hootie & The Blowfish, and O.A.R. are just a few of the popular entertainers who have played to enthusiastic crowds on Daniel Island.

Gaillard Municipal Auditorium

The Gaillard Municipal Auditorium's theatre has a full stage and orchestra pit and seats 2,726. The 15,000 square foot Exhibition Hall can hold 1,000 for seated meal functions. There are also 5 meeting rooms which seat 50-100 each. The Gaillard Municipal Auditorium, built in 1968, is a multi-purpose facility rented by promoters for various events, for example: Broadway productions; concerts of all types, including rock and roll, jazz, pop, rhythm and blues, gospel, and classical; opera and ballet performances; gospel plays; comedians; sports events; fashion shows; dance recitals; graduations; touring children's shows; children's fairs; garden and wildlife expos; trade and vendor shows; conferences; dances; parties and meeting space.

Memminger Auditorium

The newly restored Memminger Auditorium opened in May 2008. After completing a \$6 million renovation, Spoleto Festival USA now maintains the performance and special event venue in downtown Charleston. The venue has already been used for theatrical, corporate and fundraising events.

Centrally located in the heart of the city, this is a perfect place to start or end a dine around evening, or a King Street Shopping evening!



South Carolina Aquarium

The gallery areas of the South Carolina Aquarium provide a beautiful backdrop for your event with illuminated aquariums, and expansive Great Hall and two floors of exhibit space with an array of options to fit your needs.

With exhibits focusing on South Carolina's flora and fauna, from the mountains of the upstate to 100 miles off shore, this Aquarium leaves guests fulfilled, learning oh so much about the great state of South Carolina!



Located on the banks of the Cooper River, guests will enjoy the expansive views of Charleston Harbor, including the Arthur Ravenel Bridge (the largest free span bridge in America), the USS Yorktown, and Fort Sumter.
